Christmas in the Woods



I believe we are really lucky to live near Wendover Woods and all that it offers us throughout the year. It was not that long ago that the then named 'Forestry Commission' were considering closing it down and selling it off for development. Fortunately, our local protests were considered and they decided to keep and develop the site to encourage more visitors.

Now I know not everyone likes the huge car park, the entrance barriers or the big new café but on a hot summer afternoon every space in that car park was taken and you could still walk on the road towards the Iron Age Fort without getting interference from manoeuvring cars or abandoned vehicles on the verges.



As a regular user of the woods I do miss the huge bacon baguettes you could get from the Café in the Woods, but I also

remember the days when the only refreshments you could get were from a passing ice cream van and there were no toilets!

Times change, and I need to accept that in the 35 years I have been regularly walking in those woods that I would much rather they were there than a housing development and that, even though sometimes I wish it wasn't so busy when I want to use it; overall I am pleased to see so many people appreciating what I have valued over the years.

You should check out some of the activities taking place in the woods, there are: 4 walking trails including one that's suitable for buggies and wheelchairs, Juniper cycle trail, 3 running Routes including a free '5k Park Run' every Saturday starting at 9am, a fitness trail, horse riding, orienteering trails, Go Ape, Nordic Walking, play area, picnic Area and barbecues, the afore mentioned Café and you can walk the dog away from the crowds and get a bit of peace from the world, amongst the trees.

For Christmas this year, Forestry England has arranged for a company to sell the fresh Christmas Trees until 24th December 10am until 4.30pm each day and for the young at heart, there is the new Shaun the Sheep glow trail. "An alien space ship

has crashed into Wendover Woods and Shaun the Sheep is on a mission to help the inhabitant – a lovable alien called Lu-La".

They'll need your help to charge Lu-La's communicator using your new app, a UV pen and a series of puzzles, found along a forest trail! Visitors can buy packs from the Information Point and the packs contain a mask, stickers and a UV glow light among


Parish Council News

As another calendar year draws ever closer to the end we should reflect on what we have achieved. However we prefer to look forward to a New Year and new ambitions so here is our equivalent of a 'Queens Speech' for the next year:

- We are still awaiting planning approval for the skate park but are hopeful that planning permission will be granted and we can start building it in spring next year - or before.
- Included in the planning application is a 'multi-use games area' (MUGA), it is anticipated that this will be built around the same time as the skate park and will provide access to a number of different sports that can be played on it.
- We are on course for the village hall extension and anticipate moving in by the end of the year.
- We will have a new parish office at the village hall where you can meet the parish clerk or councillors by appointment to discuss issues or pass on information.
- We are working on providing a petanque court on the playing fields for those

persons who enjoy a more sedate but equally entertaining activity.

 We are working with a few local people about converting some of our green verges and spaces into wild flower areas to attract wildlife and particularly bees.



- We will continue to monitor and report on traffic issues including speeding, HGV's, parking and on community issues including anti-social behaviour.
- On completion of the current building works we will install the fencing in the village hall car park and along School Approach to protect the children going to the play areas.
- Having taken on the responsibility for the Weston Turville Times and the Village Hall, we will undertake to ensure they are 'fit for purpose' and meet the needs of the community.

We would welcome volunteers to assist with the wild flower verges, litter picks and community speed watch, so if you can spare a few hours a month to help us to make this parish a pleasant place to live please make contact. The Council has some litter pickers which can be borrowed by those wishing to help keep our parish tidy.

We are getting reports of overflowing dog bins – Aylesbury Vale District Council empty these on our behalf and are now on their winter schedule which means that the bins are now emptied once a week. Dog owners are reminded that dog waste can be put in litter bins or taken home and put in your own general waste bin. Please do not pile up around the dog waste bins as this is very unpleasant for those living nearby.

Following requests for additional bins, we are looking to install two in Wendover Road (near the PACE Centre and opposite Triangle Business Park) and one in Church Lane.

Parish Council meetings are normally held on the 3rd Thursday of the month (excluding August and December when there are no meetings) at 7pm in the Village Hall. Most meetings finish about 9pm. Everyone is welcome to attend.

Planning meetings are at 6pm on the 1st Thursday in the hall.

We all know that we have Emergency Services who deal with most types of emergency, BUT a major incident could occur in our parish when they could not reach us quickly (such as



deep snow, extensive flooding or they are busy with a major incident elsewhere). This means that we need a Plan to help ourselves if the Emergency Services cannot reach us.

Please help us to put together the Plan - we need to know certain things from you:

- Are you a First-aider or ex health professional?
- Do you have a tractor/trailer or 4x4 vehicle?
- Do you have a chainsaw and licence to operate?
- Are you an electrician/plumber/builder?
- · Are you a caterer?
- Do you have any other skills that would be valuable in an emergency?
- Could you provide sleeping accommodation, either in your business premises or your own home? If so, how many -and can you take their pets?
- Could you provide shelter/paddocks for pets or livestock?

Hurtle Turtle

I don't think the word 'hurtle-turtle' exists in English. With its resonance of contradiction, it is curious to imagine a turtle approaching at breakneck speed. Of course, there is a confusion here between turtles and tortoises, the giant variety of which moves quite slowly indeed. On the other hand sea-going turtles move quite speedily even on land especially when racing back to sea after laying eggs. Tortoises can move too. I have a friend with a garden tortoise so consumed with sexual ardour that it races after anything at its level. Mounting leather shoes seems to be a particular pleasure.

I have no idea what hurtle-turtle means. It seems to refer to nonsense and confusion particularly in a crowded place. It has that feeling about it. You know how it is with words, don't you? They have flavours and auras catching a hidden pocket of memory which pop-up unbidden, nagging you for recognition and regard. Hurtle-turtle, as a word, sounds as though it is a contemporary word like 'robust' or 'harsh'. It also seems to be unreservedly English like the Last Night of the Proms or frustrating understatement. Almost a cultural object as it were. Certainly the form of it, a repeated sound with differing initial letters is curious but not so striking for there are many such in English.

An Italian translator friend of mind was astonished, if not alarmed, when I glossed an Italian verb for him as dilly-dally. "You have words like that in English? " he spluttered. Unintentionally, I had opened up a new world of English to him, and I think, to me. I wondered just how many words of this kind existed in English. I began to collect them. Where do you stop and what do you include? Does this kind of word have a name or designation?

Apparently they are called reduplicative words. 'Dilly-dally', for example, employs a vowel change, the same word with the change of 'i' to 'a'.. Some examples are 'chit-chat', 'shilly-shally', 'tittle-tattle', 'topsy-turvy', 'creepy-crawly' and 'fiddle-faddle'. Different from them and rather more numerous are repeated words such as 'boogie-woogie', 'clap-trap', which I am often accused of; 'hurdy-gurdy', a musical instrument with folk roots; 'higgledy-piggledy' which accurately describes the state of my room. There is 'heebie-jeebie' which never comes alone and 'mumbo-jumbo' of which we hear far too much today. These have the same vowel but a different initial consonant. A casual scan of a newspaper reveals just how common such words are.

There is an even simpler form. A syllable is just repeated such as 'so-so' or 'night-night'. Some such words refer to birds and animals like the 'aye-aye' which is a lemur from Madagascar or the 'dikdik' which is the tiniest of the antelopes, so small that it is barely noticeable in the lowest reaches of bushes. We all know the 'chow-chow', the beautiful sand-brown Chinese dog. Buckinghamshire has the 'glis-glis', a kind of unwelcome dormouse. When we next meet we can toast one another with 'chin-chin' which has even crept into Italian. I do hope we can keep 'hurtle-turtle', whatever it means.

Bye-bye.



A Curious Event

the children were delighting in it.

Listen carefully readers, for this is a tale you will only hear once.

It occurred during the severe winter we had a couple of years ago, Christmas Eve to be precise. Snow had fallen, thick and heavy, which was unusual for us as a southern English village. Yes, in Buckinghamshire, we usually escape the worst that winter throws at everyone else. Not this year, however, and

Festivities in our local pub were loud and jolly. Standing apart from the locals, a stranger stood by the fire. He appeared to be resting, and surveying his surroundings at the same time. Gradually, the infectious merriment of locals absorbed him into their celebrations.

Encouraged, by the friendliness, he warmly shook hands and was offered a drink. At first, he emphatically refused, letting them know kindly, that he had a long way to drive, and that he had only stopped to rest a while.

Christmas Biscuits



Ingredients

For the biscuits
125g butter, softened
125g golden caster sugar
1 egg, beaten
1tsp vanilla extract

For the decoration
400g white fondant icing
lcing sugar for dusting
100g pack of mixed colour ready to roll icing
tube of white icing
tube of black icing

Method

- 1. Heat the oven to 190C/170C fan / Gas mark 5.
- 2. Cream the butter and sugar until pale and fluffy, then beat in the egg and vanilla.
- 3. Stir in the flour and mix to a soft dough. Tip onto a lightly floured surface and knead gently. Put the dough on a plate, cover and chill for at least 2 hours.
- 4. On a lightly floured surface, roll out the dough to a thickness of around 0.5cm. Use a cookie cutter or water glass to stamp out 7cm rounds. Re-roll the trimmings and repeat.
- 5. Transfer the biscuits to two lined baking trays and bake for 8-14 minutes until the edges turn lightly golden in colour. Leave to cool.
- To decorate, roll out the white fondant icing on a surface lightly dusted with icing sugar. Stamp out 7cm circles using the same cookie cutter/glass as before, then use a dab of the white tube of icing to stick a fondant round on each biscuit.
- 7. Roll out one icing colour at a time (mix colours to make green, orange etc if wished). Stamp out a 7cm circle of coloured icing, cut in half and stick on the biscuit for a hat. Cut a strip of another colour and make some markings to make it look like the elasticated band of a hat.
- 8. Decorate the hats with icing spots and stripes, you could also poke holes in a ball of icing to make a pom pom for the hat. Mould lumpy balls of orange icing for the nose and black icing for the eyes. Press down to flatten and then stick on with the white tube icing. Use the tube of black icing to pipe rows of dots for the smiles. Will keep in an air tight container for up to 5 days.

St Mary's Weston Turville Improving Facilities Team, SWIFT

SWIFT was formed in 2011 to look into ways of improving accessibility to and within the Church for those with any sort of disability. The project was expanded to provide a small meeting room at the church available for use by small groups (up to about 30 seated) from the community, complete with wheelchair-accessible toilet and baby-changing facilities. The church will thus be better able to cater for children, the elderly and less able members of the community, both for services and for social or educational events.

We are preparing a list of clubs or other local groups who may be interested in using these new facilities and look forward to hearing from you if this may apply. It will also be available for children's parties, etc. Please let us know what facilities you would wish for so that we can fine-tune the detailed plans to best effect. The use of the meeting room will be managed by a committee comprising members of the PCC and some regular users of the facility. If you would be interested in being involved please contact me or the clergy.

We are in the process of renewing our planning permission and engaging a structural engineer. We are aiming to complete contracts so that we can start building this much-needed facility for the whole village in 2020. We do, however, need to raise approximately £45k to meet the estimated contract sum before we can start. Please think about the benefits this will bring to the local community and the many small groups looking for somewhere to meet, including those who need the accessible toilet and baby-changing facilities. We welcome your donations, large or small and any ideas you can provide towards this final fundraising phase. This is our mission to the community but we do need your help!

We will have a SWIFT stall at the St Mary's Christmas and Craft Fayre on Saturday 7th December (see the Church article in this magazine for more details) and plans, pictures and more details of the project will be available. 

Who lives in your area?

Turn your family stroll into a fun nature learning experience! We are very lucky to live where nature is on our doorstep, but have you ever wondered who else enjoys and lives in our countryside and comes in to our gardens? We can use *animal poo* to learn more about nature.

Rabbits - Droppings are left in clusters of little, round, hard balls.

They are usually yellowy-brown or green in colour, and full of grass.

Foxes have dog-like droppings that are usually pointy at one end and full of fur, feathers, tiny bones, seeds and berries.

Badgers poo in shallow pits. Their droppings vary from firm and sausage-shaped, to softer, slimier and darker if they've been eating lots of worms!





Deer have shiny, dark pellets that are pointy at one end and often stuck together in clusters.

Bats leave droppings where they roost, so they can often be found stuck to walls or on the ground under holes or trees. They have a rough appearance

and are filled with chewed-up bits of insect.



Hedgehog poos are about 5 cm long, cylindrical and generally quite dark. They might be filled with bits of insects and worms.

When is a poo not a poo? When it's a pellet! Owls leave pellets that look like poo, without the smell.

Next time you're out, try to spot these signs and impress everyone with your knowledge of wildlife and poo!
