# MAKE A CHANGE BECOME A COUNCILLOR

Do you care about Weston Turville? Do you want to do something positive for your community? Can you think, listen and act locally?

#### WHAT DO LOCAL COUNCILS DO?

Your local council has overall responsibility for the wellbeing of your local community. Their work falls into three main categories:

- Delivery of services;
- Improve quality of life for residents;
- Give communities a democratic voice.

#### **BECOMING A LOCAL COUNCILLOR**

As a local councillor you can become a voice for your community and make real change. Councillors are community leaders and represent the interests of the communities they serve. Local councillors have three main responsibilities:

- Decision-making;
- Monitoring;
- Getting involved locally.

#### **GETTING ELECTED**

To stand for election to a local council you must be:

- a UK or Commonwealth citizen; or be a citizen of the Republic of Ireland; or be a citizen of another Member State of the European Union;
- at least 18 years old;
- an elector of the local council; or in the past 12 months lived or worked in Weston Turville parish (as your principal or only place of work); or live within three miles of the local council boundary.

## Parish Council News

At the time of writing the country is in the midst of lockdown but the vaccine rollout appears to be on target and we hope that life will soon be back to some sort of normality. The Weston Turville Coronavirus Support volunteers are still active and if you need any help please contact them (details on page 4).

#### **Elections**

Local elections are due to take place in May this year, if you are interested in becoming a parish councillor please contact the Clerk or one of your current councillors for further information. Candidate nomination forms will be available from Buckinghamshire Council in March.

#### Village Fete

After much deliberation and with great sadness it has been decided to cancel the village fete this year. It takes a lot of organisation which would usually have started by now but due to the uncertainty caused by the pandemic it was felt it would be irresponsible to go ahead. If restrictions allow, we hope to hold a family fun day on the recreation ground on 19<sup>th</sup> June which can be organised at shorter notice. See advert on page 7.

#### Precept

The Parish Council have considered the budget requirements for 2021-22 and are pleased to say that the increase to the precept has been kept to 2%. The precept is collected via your Council Tax and the Parish Council's proportion for a Band D property for the forthcoming year will be  $\pm 58.40 -$  or  $\pm 1.12$  per week. The precept is used to fund the majority of the work the parish council does, including, but not limited to:

- maintenance of the village hall, recreation ground, playground, tennis courts
- street furniture (eg streetlights, seats, noticeboards)
- services devolved by Bucks Council, such as grass verge cutting.

#### **Climate Action**

The Parish Council is working on reducing its carbon footprint and the first project will be to install solar panels at the village hall. It is hoped this will be completed in 2021. Please see the website for ideas on how to reduce your carbon footprint.

#### **Community Orchard**

The Parish Council is in discussions with a local landowner to lease an area of unused land in order to plant a community orchard, the costs of clearing the land and planting the trees will be met from Section 106 funds which are paid by developers and not the precept. It is hoped that the community orchard will become somewhere for people to come together to cultivate and enjoy free fruit from planted trees as well as being a haven for wildlife.

#### Volunteers needed!

A suggestion has been received that the Parish Council set up a group of volunteers who will help look after the parish by litter picking (particularly just before the verges are due to be cut) and reporting issues that need attention such as overhanging hedges. If you are interested in joining such a group, please contact the Parish Clerk (details at the end of this article). Litter pickers, high viz jackets and black sacks will be provided.

#### **Grass verges in the Parish**

The Parish Council was approached by a local resident asking that some of the grass verges and green areas around the parish are left to grow rather than cut monthly, in order to encourage grasses and wildflowers to grow.

In the last issue of the WT Times we asked for your feedback, suggestions and ideas of which areas of the parish could be left to grow. As expected, although the response rate was low, this proved a very divisive topic with some in favour and others adamantly opposed, asking for verges to be cut more often.

The Parish Council have considered the responses and agreed that verges without a footpath (eg one side of Worlds End Lane) will be left to grow wild, being cut in April and September. Monthly cuts will continue of verges at junctions for road safety reasons and verges alongside pedestrian paths to allow people to pass each other safely in line with the 2m social distancing rules. Keeping grass short will also help with litter picking.

#### **Parish Council Meetings**

Parish Council meetings are currently being held electronically via Zoom. You are all welcome to log in and take part or just listen to local democracy in action. Look at the website for agenda and log in details or contact the Clerk.

#### Footpaths and Rights of Way

At the time of writing the country is in the midst of Lockdown 3 and once again we are limited to what we can do and where we can go. We are very fortunate in Weston Turville to be surrounded by countryside with wonderful walks. The following pages show the the rights of way within our parish, you might find some lovely new walks. Please be aware that some routes are very wet and muddy at this time of year so appropriate footwear is a must!





Footpath 3 which goes from the village (West End) to Bedgove joins up with the Aylesbury Ring walk which will form part of the new "Aylesbury Gardenway", a circular route around Aylesbury. Aylesbury Garden Town are currently asking for feedback and suggestions from local residents on what they would like to see in the Gardenway.

The full 22mile route has been broken down into eight Nature and Heritage Walks and maps and information produced for each walking route – please visit **www.aylesburygardenway.co** to download the maps and find further

information about how you can influence the new gardenway.

If you discover any issues with the path when walking, eg path blocked by overgrowth, fallen tree or broken stile etc, please report these to the Rights of Way team at Buckinghamshire Council on 01296 395000.

#### Improvements to Recreation Ground

The Parish Council has been working hard to put Section 106 funds to good use for the benefit of both our younger residents and also for those not so young. After many, many months of working with the local planning authority we believe we have now found a way forward and you will see the proposed new layout below.

We have plans now in place to build our skate park and also a MUGA (Multi Use Games Area). We also plan to install a permeable surface walkway around the fields for walking / running along with a Pentanque court. So that we can fit all of this into the space in a cohesive way, we will be moving some of the existing children's play area and developing with residents a wild flower Area for everyone to enjoy throughout the year. All of this will be incorporated on the main field behind the village hall. The currently underused cricket square will be in the middle of this so we will move this on to the far field between the 2 existing football pitches so that cricket can be played in a safe area. We will keep you updated on the progress of the works with notices at the village hall and also our web site. We hope you will all enjoy these new facilities.

If anyone has any ideas on any other recreation equipment we could provide for the Parish please let the clerk know so that we can include this in future plans.



#### Fatal Aircraft Crashes in Weston Turville No.1

10<sup>th</sup> August 1940

Early last year a village resident sent us an e-mail mentioning an article he had read about a Miles Magister crash in the village during 1940. We were aware of a fatal crash that had occurred on 7<sup>th</sup> March 1943 involving a Hawker Typhoon but had no previous knowledge of this particular incident.

We referred the query to a member of the RAF Museum at Halton but whilst his initial search turned up a couple of Magister crashes around that time he could find no reference to one in our village. Some days later, after further searches, the Museum discovered that the Station Flight at Halton had a Magister as part of it's Flight and that a sortie was carried out as part of a Station Defence Exercise. This led to the National Archives at Kew where it is listed as Air 81/2564 piloted by Sqn. Ldr. Walker.

A couple of days later our investigator discovered a number of postings on the RAF website almost 18 years ago and one of these came from the Stornoway Historical Society, the area of the Isle of Harris where Sqn. Ldr. Walker's family hail from. Contacting the Society brought an almost immediate response with an attachment from their records. It contained a brief biography of the pilot and his family history. The section referring to the crash reads: "Sqn. Ldr. Ian Henry Douglas Walker's death was registered at Aylesbury and the certificate states that the cause of death was 'shock following upon multiple injuries caused by the aeroplane which the deceased was flying crashing into the ground ... but there is no evidence to show what caused the aeroplane to crash" The location of death is given as Longhill Field, Weston Turville. Ian was 27 when he died and was interred at Halton (St Michael) Churchyard, Bucks (WG) 330073." Apparently there were no witnesses to the crash and it's cause remains unknown.

The Miles Magister was a two seat, open cockpit basic trainer. Because of it's low wing monoplane characteristics and split trailing edge flaps it reproduced the handling qualities of the Spitfire and the Hurricane in a safe manner. It was, therefore, used to train many of the pilots who subsequently flew these aircraft.

#### Fatal Aircraft Crashes in Weston Turville No.2

Hawker Typhoon 7<sup>th</sup> March 1943



The Hawker Typhoon has been described as one of World War II's forgotten aircraft. It had a relatively short service life having first flown on 24<sup>th</sup> February 1940 and entering service on 11<sup>th</sup> September the same year, finally retiring in October 1945. It's most successful role was as a low-altitude interceptor and long range fighter. It ultimately became one of the Second World War's most successful ground-attack aircraft.

We have a number of recorded accounts of a crash of one of these aircraft in the village in 1943. John Lawton, the then Headmaster of the village school, wrote in his diary at the time:

"I heard a crash above the noise of the wireless, but did not take any notice until Mary, who was outside sitting in the sun, came running in to say that there had been a crash in Barley Close. When I got there the plane was in a thousand pieces & many of them were blazing and giving off volumes of black smoke. The pilot's brains were scattered about the field & old Moss had covered the poor remains with his jacket – a kindly action. The plane was a Typhoon – our latest fighter & the pilot lopped off the top of an elm tree in Tom Gadsden's meadow, and dropped a great piece of wood through his cow shed roof, just missing his head as he was milking. The plane then crashed out of control into Munger's kitchen garden, cut two feet off his wall, bounced into the air again, hit a tree by the side of the moat (setting it on fire) & finally ended up near the far side of the field, the pilot, God rest his soul, being flung clear & lying 50 yards away from the tail & fuselage."

Other accounts of the incident can be found in 'Memories of a Weston Turville Boy' written by Mick Dubberley and published by the Historical Society. The book is available by applying to treasurer@wthsoc.org.uk.

The account given above is taken from 'Much More than the Village Schoolmaster ... excerpts from John Lawton's personal Diaries 1939 – 1945' Unfortunately, this book is no longer in print but the society has a copy which can be loaned, for a small fee, on application to the Treasurer.



David Smith, who lives in the village, has provided the sketch above of the probable final flight path of the Typhoon. It seems from all accounts that Sgt. Theodore Narishkin, the Polish pilot, heroically brought the aircraft down without any serious damage to property or loss of life, other than his own. Quite a feat, particularly for someone so young. He was only 20 years old. It would be nice to think that we in the village could find a way of recording this event. Perhaps with a plaque close to the War Memorial.

I suspect we'll emerge gradually over time but I hope we do not go back to 'normal'. I hope that during this time we stand before Almighty God we take stock of our lives. I pray we will emerge into a better world in which people care for each other, near and far away, a world in which we humans take better care of the environment.

#### St Mary's Weston Turville Improving Facilities Team, SWIFT

Looking back at my article in the December issue of Weston Turville Times I am amazed by how the situation has changed. Everything that I mentioned then is now complete, except the funding. The timber frame of the building gives a very good idea of the shape and size, the roof is now on and weatherproofed with its final surface. The centuries-old framework of the south porch, which was in dreadful condition, has been reconstructed and strengthened with new oak sections but the historic timbers retained. By the time you actually read this the internal walls of the building and the window frames should be in place.

There have been delays, as in any major development, some caused by weather and some by the unknown elements of archaeology and of the condition of the porch and other areas which could not be assessed until the demolition revealed its ancient secrets. A further delay was caused by a subcontractor being forced to isolate due to coronavirus, a sign of the times. Unfortunately, delays cost money, especially when the contractor is unable to work and heavy, hired plant is standing idle. This has cost at least £6,000 over budget.

Unfortunately, the planning officer has also cost us an estimated £7,000 by insisting on the exterior being oak, rather than the Douglas fir which we planned for. Our architect, quantity surveyor and the contractor all agree the there is no appreciable difference in appearance, stability or expected life of the two timbers but we have no choice other than to comply with the decision.

Progress is still being made and the completion date is hoped to be by Easter, not that we will be able to make full use of the building until the effects of the virus have receded. However, we will be happy to receive any enquiries about future use of the building by groups or individuals.

Our funding shortage is now over £25,000 and we have been unable to hold any fundraising events in 2020 or for at least the first 6 months of 2021.You have all been so supportive of these events in the past and I know you have enjoyed them as well as helping our funds. If you are able to make a donation in lieu of what you may have spent at our Fun Day and various sales it would help to make up for what we have lost and for the additional costs we have suffered.
