Weston Turville Emergency Plan CAN YOU HELP!

We put a shout out several times for volunteers to help with collecting, shopping and delivering during this current pandemic. I, for one, was amazed at the number of responses we had and how willing some of you are to assist in emergencies. However, this way of getting volunteers is slow and haphazard. We need to get a list together of people with certain skills or equipment we can call upon first before shouting out to the whole parish.

We will not hold you to being at home when an emergency occurs or prevent you from moving to a new house at some stage, but whilst you are here we would like to utilise you! What we need is a name and contact number for us to call in the first instance; if you are out or busy or have had a skin full.....we will call the next person on the list. Examples of emergencies that may affect Weston Turville are:

- Heavy snow
- Aircraft Incident
- Major Transport Incident
- Fire, explosion
- Gales / Storms
- Heat wave
- Pandemic, eg flu

This list is not prescriptive and may include other events but hopefully not alien invasions, our plan doesn't cover that!

For information: our Emergency Plan is activated when an emergency occurs and it is clear that the emergency services will be overwhelmed, or they are unable to reach the scene in a reasonable time or they require extra support. It may also be activated on the advice of emergency services or appropriate organization of an impending emergency, eg heavy snow, severe weather.

We would like to keep a list of volunteers who have:

1st Aid skills (human and animal)	Camping equipment inc. gas bottles
4 x 4 owners and drivers	People with rescue skills (retired emergency etc)
Chainsaw owners	Wheelchairs/ mobility scooters to borrow
Plumbers	People to assist with general duties.
Electricians	Caterers or people who can assist with catering
Trailer owners / tow bars	Heavy lifting gear or any lifting gear

Again, this list is not prescriptive and depending on the type of emergency; other skills or equipment may be required.

If you have any of the skills or equipment mentioned above and do not mind your contact details being kept for emergency call out purposes only: please email, phone, write to or send smoke signals to the Parish Clerk. Details below.







6. Read through that book which you have just 'not had the time to read'.



Parish Council News

Although many, if not all, events planned for 2020 were cancelled due to coronavirus and some projects put on hold, the Parish Council continues to work on your behalf to help make our area a pleasant place to live and work.

We are coordinating a **Community Fibre** project to improve broadband connections and speeds to those in poorly served areas. Although the initial expressions of interest have been submitted to the provider, it may still be possible to get involved. Contact the Clerk for more information.

We have committed to working with Climate Action Wendover to reduce our carbon footprint and will be looking at alternative green energy options for the village hall. See our website for ideas of how you can reduce your personal carbon footprint.

You will see in the magazine the draft design for a village sign being commissioned by the Council. It will be installed on the old green outside the Union Chapel in Worlds End Lane, the planning application has been submitted and at the time of writing, we are awaiting the outcome of this.

A lot of work went into making the village hall and processes covid safe to allow it to reopen in September, we are pleased to say that bookings are steadily increasing and that although we currently cannot accept bookings for parties, as soon as government restrictions are lifted the hall will again be available for these.

We are also delighted to be able to lease the football pitches to two local football clubs for the 2020-21 season. Both clubs have commenced games and enjoying the season.

Litter Pick



The September litter pick was very successful, 28 litter pickers turned out and between them collected 30 bags of rubbish from around the village. A huge thank you to all those who took part.

We are planning to organise two litter picks per year in April and September, look out for details next year.



Skate Park and MUGA

Following an objection from Sport England, we are taking advice on a new layout for the recreation ground that will accommodate sports pitches, tennis courts, children's playground as well as the proposed new skate park, MUGA and Petanque court before a new planning application is submitted. We hope to finally start building during 2021.

Grass verges

The Parish Council has been approached by a local resident who has suggested that the grass verges are not all cut but some left to grow wild to encourage wildlife. The verges are currently cut 6 times a year throughout the 30mph areas and some 40mph areas of our parish. We want to hear your views – please email the Clerk to let us know if you think this is a good idea or if the grass should continue to be cut regularly.

- Bus shelter to be installed in Worlds End Lane by the new housing development
- New dogs bins to be installed following the recent consultation
- > Picnic benches and teen shelter for the recreation ground
- Footpath around the recreation ground "Walk a Mile a Day"
- Community Orchard

The Climate and Ecological Emergency and Residents of Weston Turville

On 1st May 2019 our UK Parliament declared a Climate and Ecological Emergency¹. This was in response to scientific evidence which told us (in October 2018) that we had only 12 years in which to reduce our greenhouse gases to zero to stand any chance of keeping below a 2°C average rise in global temperature. If we did not succeed we would face catastrophic, irreversible consequences that threatened our very existence on the planet². Despite a series of UN Climate conferences and treaties our atmospheric carbon dioxide levels have continued to rise exponentially.

What can we do?

Most of us want to do the right thing, but it's hard to know what "right" is. Almost none of us want climate change, endangered wildlife or plastic pollution but, the reality is, it's a consequence of the lives many of us lead today.

A recent baseline study of the carbon footprint of Wendover highlights the biggest areas of carbon emission for communities like ours. It's very helpful because it shows the choices that we can make as individuals to reduce our emissions. Will it make a difference? The answer is an emphatic "Yes!" By living lightly and choosing what is best for us and the world we encourage those around us to do the same things — and the community of those who care grows.

These are the headlines:

- Petrol and diesel-driven car journeys are the biggest source of emissions for communities like ours. Switching to electric or hybrid vehicles will have an enormous impact but consider other options including car sharing, public transport and, of course, cycling and walking for short local journeys.
- Reducing the number of **flights** we take, or not flying at all. This applies equally to
 personal flying and business miles although we may have less control over our
 business travel.
- We can reduce our emissions at home (and our bills) by installing solar P/V
 panels. Also we can improve the insulation on our homes by making the most of
 the Government Green Homes Grant Scheme, a £2bn package designed to make
 homes more energy efficient and save you money³.
- The fourth area is **diet and food waste**. By eating less red meat and dairy we can significantly reduce our emissions. High meat eaters are estimated to have an

Christmas in Jamaica

A while ago my then wife and I went to Jamaica for Christmas to visit her father and her brother, Calvin, and his family who lived in Constant Spring on the outskirts of Kingston. Getting off the plane, we were greeted by a wall of heat and a welcoming Jamaican family. As you can imagine, Christmas in Jamaica is somewhat different. The island is extremely hot all year round with a short wet season in August. It is bright, colourful, noisy and both exciting and excitable. Much of life is conducted outside in the early morning or in the evening.

Christmas for Jamaicans is certainly not about snow, illuminated conifers or robins on Christmas cards. They are a religious and devout people, so Christmas is taken with due reverence but with such joy. As a people, they adore parties and one another's company. The country is also a haven of creativity. I mention Bob Marley and the reggae tradition, a local school of painting reflecting the colour and brightness of the environment, the theatre in Kingston of eighteenth century origin, wonderful punches with or without rum, and would you believe it, English Christmas pudding flavoured ice cream!

My brother-in-law's house was cool and open. It was shared by his wife, his three daughters, three dogs and a goat. More of the goat later. Christmas was a specially good time to visit Calvin. His birthday was on the 27th so there were days of celebration and conviviality ahead. Although Cecile had lived in London for a number of years, she had kept contacts with many friends from her earlier life. There was too much to enjoy and celebrate. On Christmas day, she and I had been invited to a party that started at six in the morning! We set off on foot for her friend lived just a little further on. The rum and the whisky flowed. It was not long before we were slightly oiled and very relaxed. At eight we decided to walk back to Calvin's. He might be a little worried about our absence. We were not wrong for he met us in the car looking a tad concerned. Middle-class Jamaicans do not walk they drive.

As we arrived home were greeted by an aggressive goat, tethered to the front of the house. The house dogs avoided it for it proved adept at defending itself when another animal approached. This was Christmas dinner. I doubt whether Jamaicans eat turkey. Goats run wild on the island and are a common source of lean meat. You may have come across 'curry goat' served with rice, a Jamaican speciality. I do wonder why we don't eat more goat in Britain. Christmas dinner was awaiting Mr. Northstreet, who provided executionary services in Constant Spring for Jamaicans too squeamish to cut the throats of angry goats. Christmas dinner was an amazing variety of dishes. Jamaican cooking is extremely varied, reflecting the culinary expertise of the groups who compose the population.





St Mary's Weston Turville Improving Facilities Team, SWIFT

As forecast in the September issue of Weston Turville Times work on the church extension for the SWIFT Community Project did start in September. Our contractor is Edgar Taylor Ltd who has been responsible for wonderful extensions and major works at several other local churches, including Wendover and Princes Risborough, so we are in good hands. The necessary demolition of the outside toilet and other minor outbuildings has been completed and the excavation for the foundations and floor slab are also complete.

There has been some concern at inaccurate information about human remains being found. This was inevitable as this area was used for burials prior to about 1900. Any such remains found will be afforded a new Christian burial in the same area and at the appropriate time. Archaeologists were present throughout the excavation to ensure all regulations were followed and any remains treated with full respect. I have great admiration for their work and for the inch by inch accuracy and respect of the mechanical digger driver. No marked graves have been or will be disturbed.

The excavated soil is gradually being spread within the churchyard, again in accordance with regulations that it must remain on consecrated ground. This and any other grassed areas damaged by the heavy machinery will be levelled and reseeded at the completion of the works. It is hoped that the extension will be complete by March, subject to delays caused by winter weather or Covid 19.

Following our leaflet drop around the Parish we have received a number of generous donations and many enthusiastic messages of support, for which we thank everybody involved. We have had some unexpected additional costs, including for removal of asbestos and would welcome further donations to help us to meet a shortfall, still in the region of £15,000.

Sían's Apple Cake

Ingredients:

450g cooking apples – peeled and chopped into small chunks

350g self raising flour

225g butter or marg (Stork works really well)

175g caster sugar

125g sultanas

2 teaspoons cinnamon

½ teaspoon ground nutmeg

3 eggs
